

Martin Luther King Jr.

was a social activist and Baptist minister who played a key role in the American civil rights movement from the mid-1950s until his assassination in 1968. King sought equality and human rights for African Americans, the economically disadvantaged and all victims of injustice through peaceful protest. He was the driving force behind watershed events such as the Montgomery Bus Boycott and the 1963 March on Washington, which helped bring about such landmark legislation as the Civil Rights Act and the Voting Rights Act. King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 and is remembered each year on Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, a U.S. federal holiday since 1986.

Tu B'Shevat

The name *Tu B'Shevat* is derived from the Hebrew date of the holiday, which occurs on the fifteenth day of Shevat. "Tu" stands for the Hebrew letters Tet and Vav, which together have the numerical value of 9 and 6, adding up to 15. The date may also be called "Ḥamisha Asar B'Shevat" (חמשה-עשר בשבט, "Fifteenth of Shevat")

Tu B'Shevat has developed into an ecological holiday that reminds Jews of our connection to the earth and to our role as caretakers of the environment. Some modern practices include donating money to plant trees in Israel or planting trees locally.

The 15th of Shevat on the Jewish calendar—celebrated this year on Monday, Monday, February 6, 2023—is the day that marks the beginning of a "new year" for trees. Tu B'Shevat marks the season in which the earliest-blooming trees in the Land of Israel emerge from their winter sleep and begin a new fruit-bearing cycle.

Environmental Study Texts

Devarim 20:19: It is forbidden to cut down fruit bearing trees outside a besieged city, nor may a water channel be deflected from them so that they wither, as it is said: "You must not destroy its trees."

Avot de Rabbi Nathan, 31b Rabbi Yohanan ben Zakkai used to say: If you have a sapling in your hand, and someone should say to you that the Messiah has come, stay and complete the planting, and then go to greet the Messiah.

Bereishit (Genesis)2:15: And the Lord G-d took Adam, and put him in the garden of Eden, to work it and to tend (guard, watch) it.



International Holocaust Remembrance Day

On November 1, 2005, the UN General Assembly adopted resolution 60/7 to designate January 27 as International Holocaust Remembrance Day (IHRD). The date marks the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau and is meant to honor the victims of Nazism. The same resolution supports the development of educational programs to remember the Holocaust and to prevent further genocide.

Resolution 60/7 not only establishes January 27 as "International Day of Commemoration in memory of the victims of the Holocaust," it also rejects any form of Holocaust denial. The resolution encourages member states of the UN to actively preserve sites that the Nazis used during the "Final Solution."

Drawing from the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the resolution condemns all forms of "religious intolerance, incitement, harassment or violence against persons or communities based on ethnic origin or religious belief" throughout the world.
